THE MUSE

Inspired by everyone else's gorgeous work (Meena, Rick and Marie Ware, Amira, Barb G, Sheryl, to name just a very few!), I decided I should enter a quilt show.

The National Quilt Museum's biennial show had selected The Roaring Twenties as this round's theme, and since I'm a big fan of the aesthetics of that era, I decided to enter. I had very little time to work on it, although the theme had been announced early enough to give everyone over 4 months to do it. I had too many other deadlines and work priorities to even think about it or read the rules until 2 weeks before the deadline. Fortunately, it's relatively small, about 30" x 40".

My design is based off a piece of unattributed fan art I found on line dedicated to my favorite Roaring Twenties fictional sleuth, Phryne Fisher (from the eponymous series by Kerry Greenwood). The rules required at least one traditional quilt square, so that is the log cabin in satin and lace behind her head.

I knew I wouldn't win (I've seen what won in prior years, and my style is not what they are looking for), I was just hoping to be a finalist. This gave me a lot of freedom to not worry about what would appeal to the judges and just do things with my preferred techniques and aesthetic.


So I focused on using the best types of fabric to convey what I wanted - rather than traditional cottons, and on making it 3-dimensional. It uses silk, satin, lace, wool, faux fur, cotton, microsuede, taffeta, feathers, fancy embroidered trim, and an old earring! The sewing is a mix of hand and machine.

I got my wish and was selected as a finalist (winners have not yet been announced, but positive it's not me), and the piece will tour the country for the next two years! I'm pretty happy with it and very honored to be selected.

If you are looking for a light, but fun read featuring a very strong female lead and some FANTASTIC fashions described, I recommend the series, set in 1928-29 Australia (and yes, they made a TV show and movie out of it, with more fabulous clothes!).









JESSICA GRADY

"Journey into the Unconventional"

Jessica is a contemporary embroidery artist who works from her home studio just outside of Leeds, West Yorkshire. Her colourful and contemporary work has been exhibited in various galleries across the UK and Europe. A member of the Crafts Council's Makers directory, Jessica speaks about her creative practice and teaches workshops across the country in schools, universities, and for private organisations.

Her sculptural designs are a textural and visual feast, combining bold colour and clusters of embellished treasure that is created from a combination of waste and recycled materials. Jessica uses various processes including printing, foiling, dyeing and melting to transform what others perceive to be rubbish into tactile and creative embellishments. Her designs are hand stitched using traditional stitches in contemporary colours and patterns.

Colour is an important aspect of her work – her designs are fearless in their use of strong colours, creating a very vivid and saturated colour palette. Jessica's inspiration is derived from zoomed in views of surface texture details such as peeling paint, barnacles, and rusting metal.

"Make Your Own Sequins"

Fuse various recycled plastics to make sequin sheets, which will then be cut out in different ways, adding textile foils, and stitching onto fabric to make a sampler.

"Fantasy Florals"

Create beautiful 3D floral designs on fabric, using a range of mixed media materials combined with hand embroidery. Jessica will show you some of her techniques to create the most beautiful blooms including 3D folded petals, beaded stamens, and curling leaves and vines. Discussion will focus on the use of traditional textile materials, and ways to include recycled and waste materials, transforming them into embellished treasure. Participants will make a mini textile sampler of floral ideas, ready to frame as a piece of textile art. Finishing and framing ideas will also be discussed.


"Nature in Contemporary Watercolor"

"Manual and Electronic Cutters"

Join us for an overview of many different types of manual and electronic cutters available. Whether you already own one or more of these devices, or are considering purchasing one, come find out more about them and put them to the test to see what they can do for you. A small fee (TBD) will be collected at the door to cover maintenance on the cutters and the cost of making a small panel project.

The morning includes the general meeting followed by a PowerPoint presentation showing lots of examples of finished projects using electronic and manual cutters and discussing the pros and cons of each. Members may have lunch and stay for a Sit & Stitch in the choir room.

The afternoon will include demonstrations of the cutters and time to complete a small project using some of the techniques shown.

Demonstrations and Workshop

How to...

- Use template sheets to create stencils with the Scan n Cut and Cricut cutting machines.
- Apply and use stencils.
- Use the Sizzix manual dies with the Big Shot manual cutter.
- Cut paper, fabric, vinyl, heat transfer vinyl, etc. on manual cutters.
- Emboss on paper, metal, and leather to add textures and designs.
- Cut fabric with thin metal dyes.
- Use the Accuquilt cutting machine:
 - o cuts multiple layers
 - o maximizes fabric
 - o eliminates body strain

Participants will cut out 3 hearts using a manual die cutter and create a design on their fabric. You can hand embroider the Heart panel with names and special dates like weddings, birthdays, and anniversaries.

As an alternative, you may cut out 3 different shapes and create a design of your own.

Supply List

- Two fat Quarters and/or fabric scraps
- 8 x11 batt for lining
- fusible web with paper backing, like Wonder Under or Heat & Bond
- basic sewing and embroidery supplies
